From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends:

This parable may sound to us as if it described a purely imaginary situation, but that is far from the case. It describes something that frequently happened at certain times in Palestine, and even today in our area we see men waiting to be hired by Lowe's or Home Depot. In Israel, if the harvest was not gathered before the rains came then it was ruined and to get the harvest in was a frantic race against time. Any worker was welcome, even if he could give only an hour of his time.

The men who were standing in the market place were not lazy idlers. Men usually came early in the morning with their tools, and waited. Some would stand until five o'clock showing how desperately they wanted to work. These hired workers were the lowest class of workers, and life for them was very precarious. If they did not find work on a given day, their children would not have anything to eat that night. And so this parable gives a vivid picture of the kind of thing that could happen in any Jewish town.

What does this parable mean for us? It could signify that no matter when a person enters the kingdom of God, early or late, he is equally precious to God. It can also imply that an old person may die full of life and achievement, or a young person can pass who is just about to start his life. From God both will receive the same welcome; neither has come too soon or too late.

The workers did not all do all the same work; but they did receive the same pay. There are two great lessons here. The first is, all service, all jobs, rank the same with God. It is not a matter of what we do, but how we do it, if we do it with love. The second lesson is even greater—all that God gives us is a grace, a gift. We cannot earn a reward from God, we do not deserve anything that he gives us. What he gives us is out of the goodness of his heart; what he gives us is not pay, but a gift; not a reward, but a grace. Let us be reminded by this gospel to see that all we have in this life is a gift.







SAINTS OF THE WEEK

Sts. Cosmas & Damian

Nothing is known of their lives except that they suffered martyrdom in Syria during the persecution of the Emperor Diocletian.



A church erected on the site of their burial place was enlarged by the emperor Justinian. Devotion to the two saints spread rapidly in both East and West. A famous basilica was erected in their honor in Constantinople. Their names were placed in the canon of the Mass (Eucharistic Prayer I), probably in the sixth century.

Legend says that they were twin brothers born in Arabia, who became skilled doctors. They were among those who are venerated in the East as the "moneyless ones" because they did not charge a fee for their services. It was impossible that such prominent persons would escape unnoticed in time of persecution: They were arrested and beheaded.

Nine centuries later, Francis of Assisi (October 4) rebuilt the dilapidated San Damiano chapel outside Assisi.
