

#### Dear Friends:



The opponents of Jesus are getting tired of hearing all these parables about the Kingdom and it is far too ambiguous for their purposes, so they press him further. You can tell a lot about a person

from the Paster's Dest further. You can tell a lot about a person from his enemies and we can see that Jesus had adversaries from all different religious and social positions. It is a strange set of bedfellows in this week's gospel, the Pharisees and the Herodians. The Pharisees are purists and see Roman rule and any extension of it into Jewish life as an abomination. The Herodians are those who support Herod and the Romans who have placed him in charge.

What is interesting to note is their joined hatred for Jesus overrides their politics so they band together against Jesus and create a predicament that leaves no way for escape. They both want to get rid of him for different reasons. Their hatred of him leads them to call him to his face "the truthful teacher of God's way." They do not realize that their strategy gives stark witness to the heavenly character of Jesus Christ. It is a sign of the Holy Spirit that he always rises above the entanglements of any human situation and at the same time he does not become distant to it. Oh, how I would love to do the same.

They even call him 'teacher' as part of their strategy to entrap him. It is ironic that these so called 'disciples' say the truth about him insincerely but it is his truthfulness that is unbearable to them. They want to do away with him in order to be free of his inopportune presence and they cut themselves off from the Source of light and life. Even worse, they do it deceitfully. Jesus is not taken in by their flattery. Jesus is himself the Truth and he very easily reads into their hearts.

Let us reflect on this gospel and try to find ourselves in it. I invite you to pray for the ongoing Synod on the Family and not be tricked by the media as it covers the study paper that the Synod released this week. The document reiterates how the teaching of the truths of our faith cannot change, and the media somehow forgets this. The document is also for study for one year. It seems to me what is being suggested is that our approach and our language to those who are divorced or cohabitating or in same sex relationships should be more merciful and welcoming without condoning their difficulties. 

#### 2014 FINANCIAL REPORT

A person on our Parish Administration Committee commented that the annual report we publish each year is not easy to understand and I agree. Therefore, a member of this Committee will speak briefly at all the Masses to give you some highlights of their own experience and in this column I will give some background on how we are doing financially.

Our income this year was higher than last year mostly due to the fact that we did not spend as much this year that ended June 30, 2014. However, it does not include the new lower parking lot recently done (after the financial year ended) which will be in excess of \$100,000 and which looks spectacular. Always we remind you that the School Rental Income of \$236,338 all goes to the Archdiocese to repay our debts. Our debt is now less than \$100,000 and should be repaid easily this year. And so the rental income can be used for our parish needs sometime this year.

Our Christmas collection was up substantially thanks to your generosity and we collected \$70,000 in insurance claims due to Hurricane Sandy and the frozen pipes that broke in the convent. Our liability insurance each year is \$25,000 so we have been 'lucky' to receive these claims when we have accidents due to bad weather or other causes.

The plans for our renovated Convent are almost complete and will be a substantial expense that will hopefully start, in some way, this year. (My hope is that we can start to use it again before Christmas.) The total renewal of the convent will be a large capital expense. Also our church interior needs many improvements in lighting, rug, and artistic painting which are not urgent but are needed to restore it to its original beauty. And don't forget the organ which needs to be repaired, also a six figure number. Your generosity in giving regularly is very important for the well-being of our parish. The more parishioners who use envelopes or e-giving the more steady our income. We have cut back on other gimmicks of raising money and ask all of you to give a certain percentage of your income, knowing that God always repays us many times over. As you can see from the weekly report in the bulletin over 80% of our collection comes from envelope users and e-giving. Those who give cash have a fondness for George Washington.

Lastly, our cemetery in Lyndhurst made a profit this year thanks to better management and this will help us to finance our perpetual care fund and to make further landscaping improvements.

### BEATIFIED NEW JERSEY SISTER OF THE 20<sup>TH</sup> CENTURY REMEMBERED BY POPE Vatican City, October 5th., 2012

Pope Francis has held up to the world a beloved New Jersey nun beatified on Oct. 4th in the Newark Cathedral. The beatification was the first to take place in the United States.

"Yesterday," Pope Francis reflected in his remarks following today's midday Angelus in St. Peter's Square, "Sister Miriam Teresa Demjanovich, of the Sisters of Charity of Saint Elizabeth, was proclaimed Blessed in the United States.

"We thank God for this faithful disciple of Christ, who led an intense spiritual life," he said about the late sister, who is now one of seven beatified Americans.

Over the years, Pope Francis and Pope Emeritus Benedict have helped pave the way for her beatification. Yesterday, she was beatified at a special Mass in Newark's Sacred Heart Basilica. Born in 1901, Sister Miriam Teresa Demjanovich was a nun for only two years at a convent in New Jersey before she died in 1927 at the age of 26 of acute appendicitis. Within two years of graduating the College of Saint Elizabeth summa cum laude in English, she joined the Sisters of Charity of St. Elizabeth also located in Convent Station, N.J. To be a saint, the blessed is remembered for having produced many influential, devotional writings among Catholics. To be canonized, she would need to be credited with a second miracle. Her first miracle, according to the Sisters of Charity, was the case of a young boy who was declared legally blind due to bilateral macular degeneration. Through the sister's intercession, his sight was restored.
